I asked Pat if she'd like me, the President of FFS to come up and say something on her behalf to which she politely responded, "No. You talk too much." I laughed. Pat delivered her acceptance speech after being introduced by **Glen Delpit**. She began by saying, "I'm

92 years old and I'm going to tell you about events in my life that have led me to this point." I thought, "Ninety-two years...this is gonna be a long one."

No. It wasn't. She recounted the fact that she'd been born during the Great Depression, lived through World War II, and benefited from her parents' progressive work in politics and her encounters with famous folk musicians. She spoke of her early years leading to her work with the Fresno Folklore Society. She ended her speech by saying, "Thank you for giving me purpose in this part of my life."

TRAVELING ABOUT

Ready for another adventure? This is another "in California" destination. It is one of those trips that is good for Fall or Spring (crush in the Fall with turning leaves and green with wildflowers in the Spring). Napa-Sonoma is a good place to travel, with lots of places to see and things to do in a fairly small area.



My favorite way to go is up State Hwy 99 to Lodi to take State Hwy 12 West and romp across farmland and the Delta to Fairfield, joining I-80 for a few miles before peeling off at Hwy 12 again to meet State Hwy 29 just South of the city of Napa where you cross the **Napa River on a soaring bridge**. There are wineries everywhere, so if you like wine tasting, you are in luck, tons of great eateries as well.

Traveling North on Hwy 29, you roll past fields of vines on both sides of the road with a few small villages and towns as you make your way up Napa Valley. Yountville is certainly worth a stop. It is the home of The French Laundry along

with some other Michelin Star restaurants, all of which require reservations and have pricey entrees. My "place to visit" in Yountville is the **V Marketplace**, formerly Vintage 1870, which is the latest incarnation of the Groetzinger Winery buildings. It has shops, art galleries, a wine cellar, and restaurants. It is a wonderful place to shop for Christmas presents for others as well as yourself, having items that you would not find elsewhere. Of course, these days, you could order stuff online from them, but it is much more fun to shop in situ.

Leaving Yountville and traveling further up the Valley, you will come to St. Helena where you need to make a stop at Napa Valley Olive Oil, on a back street named



Charter Oak Ave. You will find locally grown and manufactured olive oil products as well as all those things one finds in a good Italian grocery store: cheeses, breads, wine, meats, and pasta, imported from Italy. You can have a snack or lunch there or travel to the North end of town and make a stop on the grounds of the Beringer Winery for a picnic.

Let's go a little further up Hwy 29. The **Bale Grist Mill State** Historic Park is at the South end of Bothe-Napa Valley State Park. The first time I stopped at the Bale Mill (thousands of years ago), it was still a ruin. It has been restored, and, on some days, they will demonstrate how it works, and you can buy meal that has been ground there. Bothe-Napa Valley State Park has both picnic and campgrounds with trails where you can wander around.

Take your bathing suit on this trip as you have a chance in the town of Calistoga to hang

out at the various spas and baths and enjoy the warm mineral waters. This is an active geothermal area. At the North end of town, a well was drilled into a geothermal hot spring and became **California's Old Faithful**. It erupts about every thirty to forty-five minutes to a height of 60 feet. Unfortunately, it costs money to see it now and probably isn't worth the outlay.

Taking the Petrified Forest Rd West across the Mayacama Range to Hwy 12 (our old friend), you can go South from there and wind your way down the Sonoma Valley. It is also called The Valley of the Moon. The Miwok and Pomo tribes gave that name to the Sonoma Valley

because the moon can appear to rise and set seven times behind the Mayacama Range from various spots. Several State Parks are in the area where you can indulge your desire to hike up and down mountains and check out the flora and fauna. One of them is **Jack London State Historic Park** West of Glen Ellen. It is worth a visit. The Valley of the Moon Observatory is on Adobe Canyon Rd that also leads to Sugarloaf Ridge State Park.

In the city of Sonoma itself, keep an eye out for the colorful fiberglass cow sculptures at various sites. During the Cow Parade Public Art Event, there are more of them, and not just in Sonoma. There are wineries

and fooderies and shopping.

Going South on Hwy 12, you will meet up with State Hwy 121/12. Turning East, you can return home the way you came. If you want a side trip for bird and wildlife watching, there are several dedicated marshlands and wildlife areas if you go


further down, closer to San Pablo Bay. If you have more time to spend in this area, check out the chance to go ballooning over the Valley or get aboard the **Napa Valley Wine Train**.

Okay, side trip. Robert Louis Stevenson, author of "Treasure Island" and "Kidnapped," along with many other works, spent his honeymoon in the Napa area in 1880 and wrote "Silverado Squatters" about their adventures. Silverado was an abandoned mining camp (without the silver, some say). There is a small museum in St. Helena and the Robert Louis Stevenson State Park which is Northeast of Calistoga on Hwy 29,



where you can hike trails on **Mt. St. Helena** for a full view of the surrounding mountains and valleys. (Sue Wirt)

BACK TO HUNTINGTON LAKE

I wait expectantly every year for the annual trek to Huntington Lake for the two-week stay at the Lakeview Cottages on the quiet side of the lake, away from the hustle and bustle of the traffic, cabins, campgrounds, and marinas (although we do a have small marina of our own). The same people generally rent the cabins

There are only 12 cabins and the host cabin, built originally in 1913 to house some of the people who worked on the Big Creek Project that dammed Rancheria and Big Creek and formed Huntington Lake along with others upstream. Paul and Karen Starcevich and their son, Paul, flew out for our summer meeting at the Lake. Ann Lamb goes up as well and now, another FFS member, Renate Ley, is also there for the same period of time. Another FFS member and friend of Renate, Valerie Forward, came up for a few days as well as Bobbie and Lance Holland who are friends of the Starcevich family The Starceviches only stay for a week and usually, Karen and I while away some of our time playing music and singing on the porch of their cabin and meet up with the Bohigians at their cabin or they come to play with us. Not so much this year as Karen had a cold

and the Bohigians had COVID. However, hiking and biking took place; water sports took place (kayaking,

swimming, sailing, and fishing) for most of the resort residents.

Paul Strand, one of the residents from Long Beach area, likes to organize stuff, so, the first Monday, he organized a hike for several people to the falls on Grouse Creek. The sky was threatening but they went anyway. As I sat on my porch and watched the clouds tumble and roll, producing lightning and thunder all afternoon, along with some rain, they returned a little bit wet from their trip. We also had four birthdays that happened in that first week, so had a little celebration at the Wednesday potluck. Campfire, campfire songs, and s'mores rounded off the evening. I usually read what we call "bedtime stories" to Karen and Ann each night. This time, I read one that night as well as on Friday night at campfire. These are humorous essays about his life written by Patrick McMannus that never fail to raise guffaws and

giggles.

A longtime friend, Donald McClellan brought my brother-in-law, Michael Hill up

Unfortunately, the Garnet Fire started the first weekend and, although over 50 miles away from us, produced a pyrocumulonimbus cloud the first Wednesday that drifted our way and over the lake. After that, we would get smoke in the morning and sometimes later in the day as well. Ash was on the porches and cars in the morning when we would go outside and the smell was evident in the cabins as well. Although it was not like the Creek Fire where evacuation was ordered or the following year when we could only stay a few days because of the closure of the National Forests in

The musical partnership between consummate performer Alasdair Fraser, "the Michael Jordan of Scottish fiddling", and brilliant Californian cellist Natalie Haas spans the full spectrum between intimate chamber music and ecstatic dance energy. Over the last 25 years of creating a buzz at festivals and concert halls across the world, they have truly set the standard for fiddle and cello in traditional music. They continue to thrill audiences internationally with their virtuosic playing, their near-telepathic understanding and the joyful spontaneity and sheer physical presence of their music.

Fraser has a concert and recording career spanning over 30 years, with a long list of awards, accolades, radio and television credits, and feature performances on top movie soundtracks (Last of the Mohicans, Titanic, etc.). In 2011, he was inducted into the Scottish Traditional Music Hall of Fame. Haas, a graduate of the Juilliard School of Music, is one of the most sought after cellists in traditional music today. She has performed and recorded with a who's who of the fiddle world including Mark O'Connor, Natalie MacMaster, Irish supergroups Solas and Altan, Liz Carroll, Dirk Powell, Brittany Haas, Darol Anger, Jeremy Kittel, Hanneke Cassel, Laura Cortese, and many more.

This seemingly unlikely pairing of fiddle and cello is the fulfillment of a long-standing musical dream for Fraser. His search eventually led him to find a cellist who could help return the cello to its historical role at the rhythmic heart of Scottish dance music, where it stood for hundreds of years before being relegated to the orchestra. The duo's debut recording, Fire & Grace, won the coveted the Scots Trad Music "Album of the Year" award, the Scottish equivalent of a Grammy. Since its release, the two have gone on to record five more critically acclaimed albums that blend a profound understanding of the Scottish tradition with cutting-edge string explorations. In additional to performing, they both have motivated generations of string players through their teaching at fiddle camps across the globe.
