Notes from Board President, Ron Bohigian







When I was in college, at the University of South Carolina, I had a mandolin, but I related to it as a guitar player. I went to my first picking party. People sat around with acoustic instruments and played a lot of oldtime tunes,

bluegrass, blues, rags—stringband music. People were asking me if I knew tunes with

names of fruit. 'Do you know Blackberry Blossom? Do you know June Apple?' I didn't connect with it. By then, I was listening to Miles Davis. Mandolin was a gateway that took me out of playing rock guitar and brought me into this other sphere. I had the mandolin, but I was not that interested in oldtime or bluegrass; I just dug the instrument. I was often attracted to new things.

In 1977, I was at a jam, and a guy put on a record that he had just bought that day. I remember excusing myself from the conversation. I sat down and watched the needle move across the disc. I was transfixed. I looked at the cover and it was a still life of two mandolins, an upright bass, a guitar,






and a fiddle. The guy thought it would be bluegrass; it was the first David Grisman Quintet record. It flipped a lot of people on their heads. The guy who bought it was very disappointed and gave me the record. I drove my college roommates crazy because I literally wore it out, and it led me down yet another pathway. Ironically, I wound up working in David Grisman's band for approximately seventeen years.



FFS Survey Summary

The Fresno Folklore Society Board would like to thank all of the members who filled out the FFS Survey. You told us what you are interested in and what more you wanted to see and do. You told us how you could help with leading activities and the talents you would like to share.

Here are a few things you told us.

Our membership is a diverse group of singers, dancers, instrumentalists, educators, visual artists, craft people, and supports/listeners.

97% of respondents attend FFS sponsored concerts.

51% participate in jam sessions, while 30% attend song circles.

37% attend music campouts.

30% attend dances.

Some of you expressed an interest in seeing/participating in new genres of jams sessions. These included drum circle, modern & progressive folk, country, pre WW2 popular, international, slow jams, song swaps, and joke telling.

When it came to slow jams and entry-level playing, there was clearly a need expressed by many of you. Beginning topics included mandolin, fiddle, uke, banjo, songs, Americana, old timey, Irish & Celtic, blues, Mexican & indigenous songs.

There was a desire to see additional new programs. These included open mic night (50%), house concerts (58%), house parties (55%), songwriter's circle (26%), poetry/storytelling circle (26%), group sing-a-long (47%), drum circle (26%), ukulele circle (18%).

So, where do we go from here? What can you do to the make some of this happen? Many of you have talents that can be shared. And many of you are sharing your talents in our community. Now is the time to help the FFS grow and become a more integral part of our community. You don't have to be a FFS board member to start something. Just do it.

We ask that you consider becoming an instigator—someone who instigates an activity. As you can see from above, there is a lot of interest in expanding the society's reach into our community. Don't be afraid to try something. You will always find someone in the FFS who would be willing to help your vision move forward.

Tighten Up Your Bows, Fiddle Day Is Coming!

International World Fiddle Day was founded in 2012 by Caoimhin MacAoidh, a professional fiddler from Donegal, Northern Ireland. The day was born out of deep respect for one of the most expert and revered violin makers, Antonio Stradivari, and coincides with the anniversary of his death in 1737. Around the world, lovers of the fiddle make music in celebration of the instrument Stradivari refined and made famous.

Presenting the best of the best fiddlers in our area in one setting, Fresno World Fiddle Day is the brainchild of fiddler Larry Cusick. He launched the annual event five years ago, backed by the Fresno Folklore Society and assisted by a small supporting committee, including Karana Hattersley-Drayton and Ron and Megan Bohigian.

This event will feature an exceptional line-up of local fiddlers old and young, playing a wide variety of traditional music from different regions and countries. JUNE'S TREASURE TROVE

More interesting recipes from the album of saved newspaper clippings belonging to June McClellan's grandmother. Because of the type of agriculture we have in the valley, they looked fitting. First is the accompanying forward:

"Two more friends have kindly sent us recipes for grape pickles; as they differ somewhat in the method of preparing them, will publish both; thereby ending the chapter on grape pickles for this year, with many thanks to those who have so kindly come to our aid.

Grape Pickles (from Mrs. I., San Jose) Three and one half pounds of granulated sugar to one quart of good vinegar, spice to taste (I assume it means the same types of spices that you put in when making the cucumber pickles from last month's article and maybe in a cloth bag as mentioned then but not mentioned here). Boil sugar, vinegar, and spices together, then pour upon the grapes cold (the grapes are cold, not the concoction—she now notes what to do with the grapes before you do this). I cut the grapes in small bunches, using either Tokaya or Muscats. Make sufficient of the syrup to cover the grapes wanted. Seal in small jars. (Sparse instructions)

Grape Pickles (from Mrs. N.M.R., Butte Meadows). One and one half cups of white sugar; one quart best cider vinegar. Boil together with a few whole cloves. Have ready the grapes, picked free of imperfect ones, washed, drained and placed in stone jars. Muscat grapes are the best but other kinds will do. Pour over the grapes enough of the boiling vinegar to cover them. Let them stand for 24 hours; then heat the vinegar and pour over the grapes again; then let them stand for three days, and repeat the process. The vinegar should be boiling hot each time it is poured over the grapes. My grapes were good eight months after they were made."

By the way, has anyone tried the alcohol rubbed on your head to stimulate hair growth that was in the last newsletter? Stay tuned for "Celery For Rheumatism" next month. (Sue Wirt)
