Notes from Board President, Ron Bohigian

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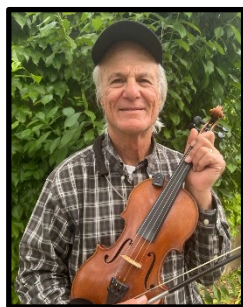

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As noted previously, my first experience attending a bluegrass festival was in Mariposa in 1997, the 6th such event. They had managed to hold five without my knowledge, but after attending four years in a row, I was hooked.

Our plans to attend a fifth year were thwarted when the series ended. I heard several reasons for this. The fairgrounds raised their rate to an unaffordable level. Co-sponsor California Bluegrass Association (CBA) backed out as sponsor. Martians were going to levitate every banjo that appeared at the festival.

OK, I made up that last one, but I never heard from anyone who really knew for sure, and the real reason was probably equally ridiculous. However, there were other options. Even before that final event, I had read of a festival getting started in Parkfield. If you drive out of Fresno toward the coast on State Route 41, where Route 46 comes in from Bakersfield there is a road going straight north. Drive 15 miles on this and you will reach a small town, whose population sign fluctuated, but always in the low double digits. The last time I noticed, it said "Population 18."

I had actually been to Parkfield once before, with no idea that I would be returning nearly 20 times over the next few years. While visiting a friend in Avenal, he took me for a ride, and we ending up enjoying breakfast at the Parkfield Café. The town is just over the hills from Avenal, but it's 45 miles by road – down Highway 33 to 41, west to Cholame Road, north to Parkfield-Coalinga Road, then less than a mile across Little Cholame Creek and the San Andreas Fault into town.

Yes, Parkfield has one more claim to fame – home to "the world's most earth-shaking bluegrass festival." The US Geographical Survey has a building there containing equipment to measure earth movement, and scientists rush there (slowly on that narrow, rough road) when there's a shake in the area. The slogan of the earliest festivals was "Be there when it happens." Fortunately, I missed out, but there was one pretty good quake in 2004, not during the festival.



SO – daughter Teri, grandson Mikie and I went to Parkfield for the first time on Mother's Day weekend 2001. I drove my pickup, towing a 28-foot travel trailer. Virtually every festival offers camping, and you can buy tickets for the entire show and camping, or just for one or two days, show only or show and camping.

After we checked in, we were directed down unpaved Oak Street toward the rodeo grounds and the "boondocks" camping area. Here we joined other trailers, motor homes and tents under a grove of valley oak trees.



Very soon we experienced one of the "bonuses" that are common at these events – we made the acquaintance of our next-door neighbor, Walt from Santa Barbara. We would enjoy seeing and talking with him for years at a number of later festivals, both at Parkfield and elsewhere.

With a 3 ½ year old child with us, we soon attracted the attention of a couple who became sort of "bluegrass grandparents" to Mikie. Rad and Tele lived in Tulare and knew many of the people involved in bluegrass in Fresno and elsewhere in the valley, and we would enjoy their company most years at Parkfield, and a couple of times at another festival closer to home.



The friendly atmosphere at these events and the small crowds at Parkfield made it a perfect place to allow a young boy to be a free-range kid, and Mikie's favorite activity at the festival was catching lizards, which he brought to the audience area and proudly displayed.

We were familiar with only one or two of the groups on the bill, although some became favorites and we would come to see some of them a number of times. One of the first groups was the String Bandits from Fresno, which was my first encounter with Mike McDonald, who eventually seemed to play with half the groups in the central valley area.

We also enjoyed the **Witcher Brothers**, who we had seen in Mariposa, and the Grateful Dudes, featuring bass player and singer Bill Bryson, another musician who popped up in many different groups, mostly from southern California.



The Cherryholmes Family

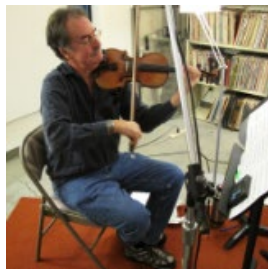
Over the years at each festival, I would experience what I considered “a revelation” – a group that was unknown to me but that stood out above the rest. At this festival it was the **Cherryholmes Family**, a band that started playing in the parking lots at festivals and became good enough to move up to the main stage. In addition to the parents, there were two sons, a fiddler and guitarist, and two daughters. The youngest was about 9 and played fiddle with a skill well beyond what you would expect for her age. Head and shoulders above them all was 18-year-old Cia, who sang and played banjo with professional skill. I would see this group a number of times, and watch as they became a national touring band, mentored at different points by Jimmy Martin, Rhonda Vincent and Ricky Skaggs.

Most of the time I have tried to stay at festivals until the last note has died out on Sunday afternoon. Since I was still nearly a year away from retirement, Teri and I both had to return to work Monday morning, so as far as I can remember, we got an early start, skipping the final act, one that had appeared twice already.

While my family was rarely able to join me, it always made the event more special when they could, and Teri had become and remains a bluegrass fan to this day.

**Board member, Bruce Honeyman, has released
his eighth album of original songs**

Bruce started composing and recording during the pandemic and it worked well to keep his spirit buoyed during those tough times, so he kept going. The result is six albums out 'in the wild.' They are available on all streaming platforms, including his new album, Snapshot. His eclectic songwriting includes Americana, Celtic and World Music songs. On his albums he composes, sings and provides all the instrumental accompaniment, save for a couple of exceptions. He also has released two other albums which are only available through him: one is bluegrass guitar duets with former bandmate in the Bad Actors, Doug Bremseth; the other is an album of quiet, original accompaniment to readings done by Bruce of the mystic poetry of Rumi, Kabir and Hafez.

He also plays octave mandolin in the Celtic trio, Morning Star, with Lance Burger and Larry Cusick. This trio plays some of his original tunes live in their performances, and they have also recorded one of his tunes on his new album. All acoustic and decidedly folk-ish in style, he writes of his own experience, the people he knows, and the places he travels to and lives in. He moved here 50 years ago from Kansas and has been a member of the Folklore Society since then. He lives by this motto: 'bloom where you're planted' even if it is an irrigated desert!

KALOS – Getting to Know you

Following the Kalos concert at University Presbyterian Church, I hosted two of the performers, **Ryan McKasson** and **Jeremiah McLane**. We sat around the kitchen table until midnight, talking and getting to know more about each other. Sometimes I worry I talk too much. This time I listened. What a pleasure getting to know these two exceptional performers and making connections. Ryan, I learned, lives in Tacoma not far from my Seattle family. He studied under Alasdair Fraser that master Scottish fiddler FFS has booked numerous times. In 1996, he became the youngest to win the National Scottish fiddle championship. And he can also sing! And compose music! I learned he knew of my ex-son-in-law Hannsjoerg Scheid (Hans York, his professional name, when folks couldn't pronounce his name), who now lives in Seattle. I'm connecting them and also with my daughter Abby who has numerous musician friends. I hope to see and hear more of him if ever I move back to Seattle.

Jeremiah McLane, I learned, studied classical piano, branched into playing blues and jazz, studied accordion, Indonesian Gamelan and West African drumming. He spent years traveling in Europe doing research for a Master's degree in music. He lives in Vermont with his wife and son and has formed several different groups, including Le Bon Vent, a sextet, specializing in Breton and French music. He has released over thirty-five recordings. I learned his wife, Annamieke from the Netherlands, is a classical pianist, and their son Luke plays an upright bass. He gifted me with several of his cds.

They were thoughtful guests. The following morning, after stripping their beds, Ryan prepared the breakfast of bacon, scrambled eggs, and toast and Jeremiah took a dip in the cold pool (a native of Vermont, he said it was refreshing!) We talked some more and shared stories. They autographed their cds with a thank you! I relished our brief time together and can remember our enjoyable visit when I play their cds.

Getting to know traveling musicians on a more personal level is one of the mind-expanding benefits of booking performers. Thank you Fresno Folklore Society for bringing them to Fresno. **(Pat Wolk)**
